- Optimizing medication therapy and counselling patients
- Supporting health promotion and disease screening

We've been busy connecting the dots between stakeholders, working towards consensus, and advocating for optimal patient care. We are involved at more government tables than ever before, and we are contributing our thought leadership in many vital policy discussions within the sector. On that note, in 2023, we were proud to welcome 11 new Partners and 3 new Members to our family, and we are very excited to have these new perspectives and expertise around our table.

And let's not overlook our new governance model, to be implemented in January 2024. This fresh approach empowers us to engage our esteemed Members and Partners more effectively, strengthening our advocacy for pharmacy business and the sector overall. It's all about inclusivity and efficiency, and I couldn't be more enthusiastic about the positive impact it will bring. But it's not just about what we're doing at home; we're also making waves on the international

stage. From presenting on Canadian pharmacy practice at the World Pharmacy Council's annual event in New York to joining as members for 2024, our connections abroad are stronger than ever, and they're informing our advocacy and our broader strategy as an Association.

Advocacy in Action

Advocacy has been top-of-mind for us this past year, and we are laser-focused on protecting the pharmacy business model while driving growth in the role pharmacies are increasingly playing as community health hubs.

This year we spent much time working to protect the sustainability of the business of pharmacy and pursue opportunities to see the sector thrive. A prime example of this is our landmark report: *The* Value of Specialty Pharmacy Services to the Healthcare System. This report quantified the value of the plethora of services pharmacies offer to serve their communities and demonstrated how these services are filling crucial care gaps in therapy management for patients with chronic, rare, genetic, or complex conditions. As Canada's first evidence-based report measuring the value of specialty pharmacy service, this report will act as an important tool for our 2024 advocacy, allowing us to demonstrate how pharmacy services can help mitigate substantial expenses in the broader health system.



Patient-centered care continues to be at the centre of all our work. In 2023, we saw expanded scopes of practice and/or increased funding for pharmacy services in all provinces, which we can all agree is long overdue. The response from patients has been overwhelmingly positive, showing that Canadians are excited and ready to embrace pharmacists' expanding role.

We also know that Canadians value access, choice, and evidence-based care, so another primary focus of our advocacy work this coming year, will be on the preservation of these ideals within our stretched healthcare system. While we recognize that pharmacies may choose to specialize in the types of services they provide, Canadians must also have the freedom to pick their provider and therapy based solely on their needs. It's all about putting patients in the driver's seat of their care journey.

These themes of access and choice are also fundamental considerations in our continued work on national pharmacare, drug pricing, and supply, all of which have significant implications for patients and the pharmacy sector collectively.

Now, let's take a moment to talk about the real heroes behind the scenes: pharmacy teams. It's easy to get caught up in discussing the future, but we can't overlook the daily grind pharmacists face. With broadened scopes of practice and expanded responsibilities in primary care, community pharmacists are feeling the strain. As a trade association, it's our responsibility to work with our pharmacy operators to support and empower pharmacy teams in their work environment.

We intend to tackle these concerns this coming year through advocacy efforts that will focus on modernizing policies and programs to reduce administrative burdens and better leverage technology to alleviate pressure on pharmacy teams. In addition to this, we'll continue collaborating with government agencies, educational institutions,

and healthcare organizations to pave the way for a sustainable healthcare workforce of the future.

Future Focus

As we step into 2024, I'm filled with confidence as I witness the profound shifts in perception surrounding the value of pharmacy services and practice. What seemed like distant aspirations a few years ago are now becoming tangible realities before our eyes. Every interaction with stakeholders, government leaders, Members, Partners, or patients, reaffirms our belief in the pivotal role of pharmacy in addressing the current challenges within the Canadian healthcare system.

Throughout 2023, we laid down crucial foundations, advancing the public understanding of pharmacy's capacity to seamlessly integrate into primary care and public health. 2023 achievements at a glance

2023 was a year of anticipation, activity, and accomplishment, where we've been in constant motion, ensuring we remained proactive and captured every opportunity to shine. Here are highlights of our accomplishments and milestones:



Attained recognition of the convergence between drug polices impacting patient access to medications and care at the pharmacy level — the interplay between pricing, coverage, supply, and therapeutic outcomes.



Released a first-of-its-kind report to quantify the economic value of the services pharmacies provide to patients taking specialty medications, demonstrating the significant care gap these pharmacies fill in the healthcare system.



Secured our position as lead source of truth and influential pharmacy stakeholder protecting Canada's medication supply.

Championed pharmacy-led primary care clinics and engaged interest of key provincial leaders on new models of care.



Protected patients and pharmacies from the risks of a single-payor national pharmacare system, including a potential \$1 billion annual impact on the pharmacy sector.



international policy tables of influence directly related to our advocacy priorities, including the World Pharmacy Council, the Adult Vaccine Alliance, the Implementation Advisory Group on Drugs for Rare Diseases.

Continued to avoid an estimated annual loss of \$113 million by further delaying new Patented Medicine Prices Review Board (PMPRB) Guidelines and reducing the total five-year impact of the new generic pricing framework from a potential \$2.5 billion down to \$23 million.

Produced more than 23 individual evidence-based assets and publications for Members and Partners.



Invited to speak at 27 stakeholder, Member and Partner events.



Contributed more than 16 on-record submissions to relevant government and regulator consultations.



Welcomed 3 new Members and 11 new Partners to the Neighbourhood Pharmacies family this year.



Amplified the voice of community pharmacy through our social media advocacy with almost 9,000 followers combined on LinkedIn and X (Twitter).

Participated in more than 25 media engagements.



Together with our Members and Partners, we have been able to tackle several important issues facing the pharmacy sector.

We Raised Awareness of Health Policy Convergence at the Pharmacy Level

Through dialogue on all our advocacy priorities in 2023, we stressed the need for a 'whole of government' approach to evaluate and assess any potential negative downstream consequences on Canadians' access to their medications and services that arise from individual health policy decisions. We demonstrated the convergence among drug polices impacting patient access to medications and care at the pharmacy level; highlighting the interplay between medication pricing, coverage, supply, and therapeutic outcomes. Access to prescription insurance is only good if the drug is available, and access to an affordable drug isn't beneficial unless there are supports in place to ensure it is used safely and effectively!

We championed the expansion of pharmacies as community health hubs on multiple fronts:

1. Advancing pharmacy-led primary care services

During 2023 we worked hard at refining, communicating and socializing the necessary scope, funding and other elements to support community pharmacy-led primary care services in clinic-style models; consistently highlighting pharmacy's value in increasing access to care at the provincial and federal level. We supported the work and efforts of many jurisdictions — amplifying successes, validating challenges, and providing a consistent supportive message of the value of pharmacy in resolving the pressing healthcare challenges being seen nationwide. A key event this year was our Council of the Federation Premier's reception, where we hosted five provincial Premiers and their policy staff. At the international level we were proud to present to showcase Canada's leadership in shaping the role of pharmacies as community health hubs to the 2023 World Pharmacy Council (WPC) annual event in New York City.

Outcomes

- Engaged interest of several jurisdictional governments on pharmacy's role in primary care.
- Amplified enablers and acknowledged challenges of pharmacy-led primary care clinics in New Brunswick, Alberta, and Nova Scotia.
- Showcased Canada's pharmacy leadership on the world stage.

2. Expanding scope to deliver increased services

In Ontario and B.C., we urged governments to build on the successful momentum of the expansion of minor ailments assessment and prescribing services. The continued expansion of pharmacy's role in providing routine immunizations was a particular advocacy focus in Ontario this year, where we supported regulatory amendments to allow pharmacy teams to administer more routine immunizations to patients. We further called for pharmacists' ability to prescribe and administer all vaccines to facilitate increases in vaccine uptake, simplify the patient journey and at an overall level, ensure pharmacy can continue to be a valuable partner in supporting primary care and public health. As a result of our leadership and visibility in this space, we were invited to join the interdisciplinary and multi-sector Adult Vaccine Alliance (AVA), which seeks to increase adult access to recommended vaccines

Outcomes

- Successful roll out of minor ailments program in B.C., expansion of minor ailments program in Ontario.
- Numerous scope enhancements in Ontario, allowing more pharmacy team members to administer more types of vaccines to a wider range of patients, and assess and prescribe antiviral medications.
- Important voice at influential table facilitating vaccine distribution through community pharmacy channel.

3. Protecting and expanding pharmacy funding

In Ontario, we were heavily engaged

in protecting pharmacy sustainability, particularly in advocating for the <u>cessation</u> of pharmacy reconciliation payments and calling for increased investment in pharmacy services. Informed by our evidence-based Value of Specialty Pharmacy Services to the Healthcare System report, we held steadfast against uncertain markup reforms that would jeopardize pharmacy operators in the long term and proposed opening a dialogue on the design and implementation of a sustainable funding model for pharmacy services and care that considers the complexity and value of these services.

We Continued to Avoid Singe-Payor Pharmacare and its Consequences

2023 was poised to be a pivotal year for

pharmacare, with the looming deadline to pass pharmacare legislation as part of the Liberal-NDP Supply and Confidence Agreement. In early summer the NDP presented a draft Pharmacare bill, centred on a single-payor universal system. We mobilized Members to advocate aggressively on the federal front and demonstrate the risks of a single-payor system to pharmacies and the patients they serve. We called for equity of access, prioritizing the uninsured, protecting access

to critical services, and collaborating with the provinces. Influential engagements with the Prime Ministers' Office, Health Canada, the Ministry of Finance, the Ministry of Intergovernmental Affairs, several key MPs on the Standing Committee on Health (ESA), as well as NDP Opposition Leader and health critic Don Davies, proved influential in delaying the introduction of a final bill until 2024, as well as gaining support and understanding for the integral role of pharmacy in the medication access pathway.

Outcomes

- Elected officials gained critical insights on the impacts of single-payor on pharmacy and patients.
- First draft of legislation avoided single-payor terminology.
- Ongoing stalemate between political parties successfully stalled further progress towards single payor legislation.
- Continued avoidance of potential \$1 billion loss to pharmacy sector.

We Solidified Pharmacy's Role in Supporting Canada's Pharmaceutical Supply

In 2023, the (then) Minister of Health called for a robust new strategy to bolster Canada's pharmaceutical supply system in response to the pervasive threat of drug shortages. As a result, we made significant progress in raising the visibility of the impact of drug shortages on pharmacy teams' ability provide patient care, while highlighting the unique perspective pharmacy can play in optimizing Canada's pharmaceutical supply system. From the frontlines, we provided valuable real-time status updates on community supply of critical drugs and collaborated with all stakeholders on key shortage communications.

At the health system level, we provided <u>detailed</u> <u>recommendations</u> to help Canada better prevent, detect, and plan mitigation strategies while also

equipping pharmacy teams to more fully play their part in collective drug shortage solutions. We were pleased to see our recommendations to financially reimburse healthcare providers for the time they spend managing shortages and the need for pharmacists' to be able to independently prescribe therapeutic alternatives, included in Health Canada's *What We Heard* Report and are optimistic for forthcoming policy changes in 2024.

On the jurisdictional front, we supported a number of engagements with the Association of Safe Online Pharmacy (ASOP); in particular supporting the work of the pharmacy sector in B.C. to prevent the illegal sale and dispensing of Ozempic to individuals in the United States.

Outcomes

- Visibility in all supply chain conversations as valid "source of truth" for status and realities of drug shortages.
- Federal acknowledgement that all pharmacists should have ability to make therapeutic substitutions.
- Successful advocacy of multiple recommendations from pharmacy's perspective to improve drug supply and prevent, mitigate and monitor shortages.
- Inclusion of pharmacy recommendations in policy documents, positive signals of policy changes to take place in 2024.

We Reduced the Impacts of Price Compression Policies

2023 was a critical turning point in our efforts

to mitigate the potential impacts of government policies seeking to constrain the price of both brand and generic medications. The guideline development delay we successfully advocated for in 2022 continued to avoid an estimated loss of \$113 million to the pharmacy sector for the duration of 2023. During this time we engaged HESA multiple times on the need to ensure broader and more meaningful consultation on guideline development, while continuing to advocate that PMPRB's new guidelines ensure medication pricing predictability and transparency for pharmacy operators. Our efforts were rewarded in late 2023 when the PMPRB announced a refreshed consultation process, including a commitment to more meaningful stakeholder engagement and policy assessment.

2023 also saw the announcement of a renewed pricing agreement for generic medications between the pan-Canadian Pharmaceutical Alliance (pCPA) and the Canadian Generic Pharmaceutical Association, including the much sought after confirmation that there will be no price reductions on currently marketed generic medications. This announcement reflects our focused jurisdictional and grassroots advocacy efforts to ensure the compounded impacts of pharmaceutical pricing policies are considered in the negotiations. This successful outcome both provides the pharmacy sector with a clear line of sight on generic drug prices and minimizes the potential financial impact on pharmacy operators.

Outcomes

- Continued avoidance of estimated \$113M negative annual impact to pharmacy sector.
- Refreshed PMPRB guideline process in line with pharmacy sector recommendations.
- Reduced generic pricing cumulative 5-year impact to \$23 million compared to \$2.5 billion in previous agreement.

- Recommendations to Renewed <u>PMPRB Guideline Development</u> <u>Process</u> (Submission to PMPRB, December 2023).

We Showcased the Value of Pharmacy Care for Patients Taking Complex Medications

This summer, we released a first-of-its-kind report

on the Value of Specialty Pharmacy Services to the Healthcare System, a crucial deliverable of our Specialty Pharmacy Strategy. The report defines, describes and quantifies the value of six major categories of specialty pharmacy services while demonstrating how pharmacies are filling gaps through the provision of specialty services that would otherwise have to be provided, and paid for, by the public healthcare system. We leveraged these findings in numerous provincial engagements to demonstrate the significant economic contribution pharmacies make to healthcare, while beginning to call for new models of pharmacy funding that are more commensurate with the complexity of care provided.

These findings anchored our November 23-24 <u>Specialty Pharmacy Summit</u> where participants came away with a commitment to ensure that patients, not drugs, drive care, and sparked some excellent ideas for building on the momentum thus far to ensure payors, governments and other stakeholders understand the value that pharmacies can provide in this space.

The federal governments announcement of a strategy for Drugs for Rare Diseases (DRD) was another crucial opportunity to advocate for community pharmacy's role in supporting equitable access to medications. Our appointment to the federal Implementation Advisory Group for the DRD, as well as, our

collaboration with Canadian Organization for Rare Disorders (CORD) continue to ensure that community pharmacy is integral to the care pathway for patients with rare diseases.

In keeping with the principles of our <u>Biosimilars</u> <u>Transition Policy position</u>, we advocated for increased scope and funding to enable

pharmacies to support successful patient transitions in Ontario. Our Spring 2023 In The Know Horizons report includes an updated analysis on the impacts of biosimilars switching policies across the country and we were invited to speak to delegates at the 20023 NASP Annual Conference on best practices and lessons learned regarding biosimilar switching policies

Outcomes

- Released landmark study validating that the pharmacy sector directly invests and offsets approximately \$1 billion in economic value that would otherwise have to be funded by Canada's healthcare system.
- Pharmacy's importance to the care of patients taking drugs for rare diseases acknowledged.
- Potential government interest in new dialogue on funding services based on complexity of care.

We Supported Resilient Work Environments for Pharmacy Staff

As staff shortages continued to plague the pharmacy sector, as well as all health sectors, in 2023 we focused on tactics to support operators in providing resilient workplaces for their employees through regulatory policy changes to improve workflow efficiencies and reduce administrative burden. We advocated for policies to support operator agency in the provision of virtual care, showcased digital tools in e-prescribing and medication safety, and worked with Members to investigate policy solutions preventing cross-provincial central fill activities.

With an eye to ongoing supply, we were honoured to be invited to bring the pharmacy sector's perspective to a series of roundtables hosted by the Canadian Medical Association to discuss solutions to Canada's health human resources crisis.

Sounding the Alarm on Rising Role of Pharmacy Benefits Managers in the Pharmacy Space

In late 2023, the risk related to pharmacy benefits managers' ability to unilaterally impose fees or terms on pharmacies was realized. While all service providers may determine their own fee structures, we raised several concerns with these developments, as a symptom of the growing influence of pharmacy benefits providers or managers within the pharmacy space. We will be focusing considerable efforts on this issue in 2024 as we build our advocacy strategy. Stay tuned!

In the know webinars

Neighbourhood Pharmacies' *In the Know* webinars remained popular among Members and Partners, providing a convenient way to keep up-to-date on policy implications of trends in pharmacy operations and the broader health system. We hosted intriguing discussions and profiled hot-button topics aligned with our advocacy issues and anchored by exceptional presenters.

Webinar themes included:

- Driving efficiencies through e-prescribing


