Methodology

- Sample size: 4,500 Canadians ages 18 and older
- Survey field dates: September 24 to October 2, 2025
- Margin of error for a comparable probability-based random sample of the same size: +/- 1.46%, 19 times out of 20.
- The data was weighted by age, gender, education, and region.






Current Sentiment & Issues In Canada




The rising cost of living (58%), housing (38%), and healthcare (33%) are considered the top 3 most important issues facing municipalities today.








Only 5 in 10 are satisfied with their access to healthcare in Canada today.







Wait times (60%), staffing shortages (47%), and difficulty acquiring care (46%) are considered the biggest challenges faced by Canadians accessing the healthcare system, closely followed by emergency room overcrowding (44%).







Over 3 in 4 Canadians currently have a primary healthcare provider, 1 in 4 do not.






Perceptions of Pharmacies Today

Canadians see pharmacists as trusted providers of everyday care, though fewer recognize their expanding role in specialized and virtual services.




Among those who accessed care at a pharmacy, 84% are satisfied with the care they received.








85% are likely to choose a pharmacy again for similar healthcare needs in the future.







70% of Canadians agree that pharmacy care is one of the few parts of Canada's healthcare system where they feel confident people will be seen quickly and treated well.








Benefits & Future Role of Pharmacies






If non-emergency care was needed today, 35% would visit their family doctor or nurse practitioner, while 34% would visit their local pharmacy.








7 in 10 Canadians would be likely to chose a pharmacy as their first stop for non-emergency health concerns, should pharmacies offer more services.








79% of Canadians would like to see pharmacies offer more healthcare services in the future.








Canadians believe expanded pharmacy services can ease pressure on the healthcare system by improving access, reducing wait times, and delivering more timely care.







7 in 10 Canadians believe that pharmacy services should be consistent across the country, so every Canadian has equal access to the same care.


